Tuesday 24 March 2020

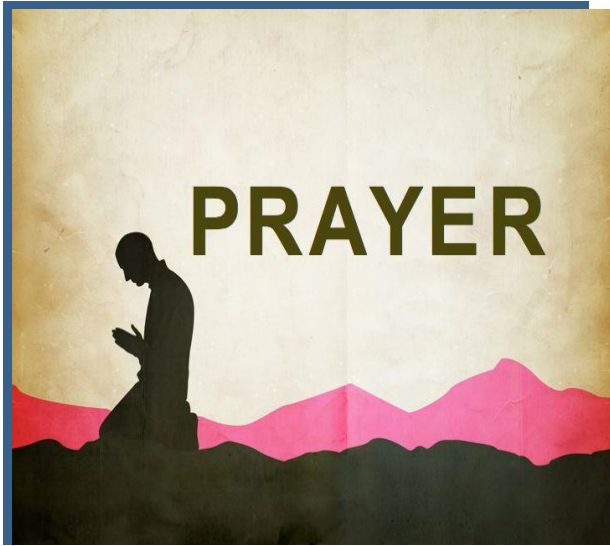
Colossians 3:1-2

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How do we speak to God?

Nehemiah provides an excellent model of prayer for us living in the post-modern world. Amid daily pressures and crisis, he demonstrates a life of deep dependence on God combined with well-planned action. During the long exile Nehemiah served as a cupbearer to the Persian King Artaxerxes I. The whole city of Jerusalem was in ruins and the broken wall around the city was symbolic of their broken relationship with God. Nehemiah was called to rebuild the wall of Jerusalem and in the task of rebuilding, provide the people who have returned from exile with safety and security.

Jesus provided us in Matthew 6:9-13 with a powerful and personal prayer when we do not have any words. Whenever we feel alone or in need of the presence of God, we can speak to HIM.

Prayer does not have to be complicated. Just speak to God when and wherever you can!

bread.**

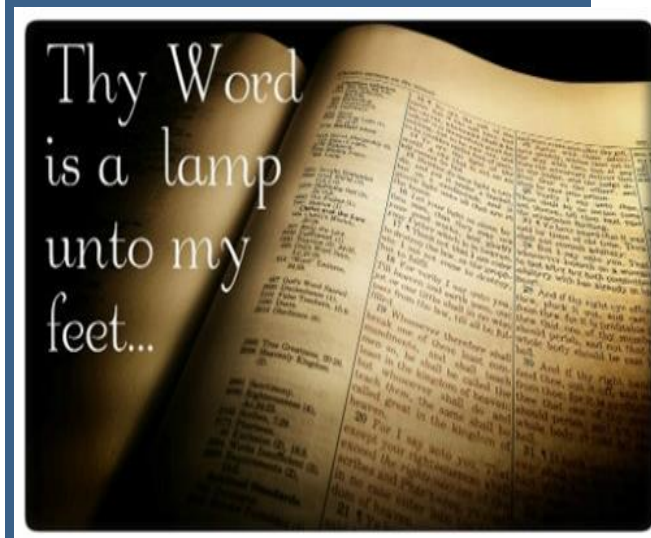
**And forgive us our debts,

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."

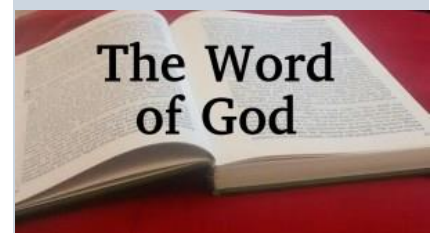

How do we listen to God?

The Greek text says: In the beginning – referring to the same wording in Genesis where creation started, there was the "Logos" – or as it is translated the Word and the "Logos" was with God and the "logos" was God. Logos can be translated as Word, reason or wisdom. John is referring to Jesus Christ since He is the TRUE revelation of God.

God speaks through His Word and His Holy Spirit to and through us. In and through Jesus Christ He showed us the way, the truth and the life. We listen to God when we obey His commandment to love unconditionally. We listen to HIM when we model our behavior according to what we read in His Word.

We have a choice when we read the Bible. We can read it as if we are reading any other book and continue with our lives as though nothing has happened in us, or we can read it and continue with our lives as people who have been changed/renewed and transformed. Amen

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How do you worship God?

To truly worship God, we must be able to know who He is and realise what He has done for us on our behalf. In Rev 4 & 5 John enters the heavenly realms and observes the response of those who are seeing God face to face.

The Christians were heavily persecuted under the Roman emperor Domitian (AD 81 - 96). The message of John to those who are persecuted, is that God is in charge and He alone controls everything. He focusses in our reading on the Glory of God reminding everybody that the emperor is not in control.

It is difficult for us to accept and admit in our current circumstances that we have no control over the Covid-19 virus who keeps on spreading. Maybe the time has come for us all to pray to God and admit that we have no control over our lives or our future. Our lives are in the Hands of God. To Him be the Glory forever!
